Former Coast Guard officer appointed to citizens' council board

Rich Nielsen is the newest representative for the City of Valdez on the board of the Prince William Sound Regional Citizens' Advisory Council. He was seated Dec. 5 as the council held its quarterly meeting in Anchorage.
